

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR HEATHER

On a recent Sunday morning, someone said to me, "Jesus talks about feeding people a lot."

Yes, he does. No, you are not imagining it. Our recent readings from the gospel of Luke have included multiple pointed directions from Jesus that the people who follow him are to share the food they have and feed those who are hungry.

Not only does Jesus give us directions through words, but he also shows us in his actions. He eats with tax collectors and sinners. He stops by the home of his friend Lazarus for a meal. He blesses and breaks 5 loaves and 2 fish to feed thousands. Even his final instructions to his disciples are given over the course of a meal.

Eating is central to life—obviously. But Jesus feeds not only our stomachs, but also our souls. He is the "bread of life" that sustains us forever, and each Sunday we remember Jesus' example when we gather around the table for Holy Communion.

Why do I bring up food now? Because just as Jesus calls us to feed the hungry over and over again, our world too often falls into fighting about how to share resources and who is worthy of having full bellies.

Food has been used as a political weapon throughout history, so I guess we should not be surprised that feeding the hungriest in our society became a political weapon this past month. While I am disheartened that this debate entered our society when we have so much abundance. I instead want to focus on how I saw you all respond: not by pointing fingers, not by shouting words of blame, not by ignoring the hungry, but by taking seriously the words of Jesus and choosing to be generous.

THANK YOU for all the food you brought in for our fall food drive, and for the many overflowing Thanksgiving baskets that will bless families in our community. And thank you for continuing to step up—asking what is needed, finding new ways to stretch resources, and always demanding that we can feed one more family. It is what Jesus tells us to do, and so we will keep doing it.

"All Creation Sings (ACS) is a sign that the church is always growing, learning, wondering and praising" remarks David Sims, Senior Music Editor for Augsburg Fortress.

ACS, published in 2020 as a **supplement** to Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW), did not initially make an impact because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Now its impact is being realized.

All Creation Sings:

- "Hymns span more than 500 years -1524 to the last decade,
- More people see themselves represented in a worship book such as Spanish speaking Lutherans, those who identify as LGBTQIA+, and everyone who has been longing for more expansive imagery for God and God's people."

"Holding a worship book in your hand means its entire contents created by the church hymns, liturgies and prayers are available to everyone. *All Creation Sings* can be used as a stand-alone resource for mid-week services, camp settings, retreats, prayer circles, Bible studies and other gatherings that might benefit from a smaller more portable worship book."

Prayers and liturgies are a blessing to caregivers; to someone who has experienced the death of a pet; those with the challenges of growing older; caregivers; and those who have experienced a violent event.

Reading and exploring <u>All Creation Sings</u>, especially during quiet time in the sanctuary can be a special comfort.

All Creation Sings is "a statement of both who the church is right now and, more importantly who the church wants to become in the years ahead. Walking into a church and seeing ACS makes a theological statement before you even open it."

<u>December Devotion</u> by Deacon Federwitz

James 5:7-12: Preparing Patiently

⁷Be patient, therefore, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. ⁸ You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. James 5:7-8

I grew up on a dairy farm in Wisconsin. The crops we grew and harvested were for the cattle. The main crop was hay. Alfalfa is high quality grass that we grew for hay and/or silage. Dad would cut the first hay of the season on Memorial Day, while Mom would take us children to see the parade in Hilbert. Too often the next day it would rain, and we needed to wait for the hay to dry before we could "make hay". Dad would say we needed to be patient – the sun will come out tomorrow. And it would! We just needed to be patient!

It was not until I went off to college in the big city of Chicago (actually River Forest, II) that I learned of how people living in the city often are jealous of the quiet life of the country. The crisp smell of fresh air or even what they referred to as the crazy time farmers call "hay season".

It is how farmers, by and large, respond patiently and graciously to the conditions that life presents: If it's dry, they say, "The rains will come". If it's wet, they say, 'At least it's not dry'. Typically, I have found that farmers, while they do complain at times, are much more content with the current conditions than folks living in the city.

As we prepare for the advent of the Messiah, we can be tempted to wish it were now. But, with confidence we can patiently rest in knowing that all is in God's hands. As we journey deeper into Advent this year, may we see again that all is complete.

I love the great line in the Christmas carol: 'Joy to the world, the Lord is come.' It sounds like bad grammar, but it is correct. Jesus *is* come; he is here and remains here, which gives us the confidence to wait patiently for the fulfilment of the age.

Lord Jesus, when we feel overwhelmed, help us to remain patient. Remind us of your promise to be wherever we are. As we approach this season of life, please give us your peace in all that happens. Amen.
